Conservation Law Enforcement Officer (CLEO)





Fort Gordon Directorate of Emergency Services

The Director of Emergency Services (DES) and Conservation Law Enforcement Program encourages any person to report violations of Federal, Georgia state, and Fort Gordon laws, rules, or regulations to include: poaching, any act of disturbing threatened or endangered wildlife species, damage or destruction of critical habitat or archaeological sites, illegal taking of forestry products, etc.

Individuals who witness violations are encouraged to immediately notify the Law Enforcement Center (LEC) at (706) 791-4380. Immediate reporting will significantly increase the ability of Law Enforcement to initiate an investigation and take steps to an appropriate action with the suspected violator. Please do not call or leave messages at the Conservation Law Enforcement Office concerning violations that are currently taking place, as we are normally out on patrol and not able to respond to your complaint in a timely manner.

If you wish, you may remain anonymous.

In case of an emergency: Dial 9-1-1 (Tell operator/dispatcher you are on Post!)





Fort Gordon Directorate of Emergency Services

- It is imperative that you <u>Do Not Confront</u> any person you feel is violating the law, thus not putting yourself in danger. A CLEO or Military/Civilian Police Officer will be dispatched to your calls upon calling the LEC at (706) 791-4380.
- iSportsman will be checked daily by LEC and/or CLEO personnel for any check-in and check-out violations. Failing to sign in/out before/after recreational activities will result in suspension of your recreation privileges.
- You must check iSportsman for training areas, lakes/ponds, and/or bicycle routes available for recreation
- Please ensure you print out and complete a Training Area Parking Pass and place it in view on the dash of your vehicle. Pass is required for all recreational activities and is available on the iSportsman website: (look under "Regulations and Forms").







Fort Gordon Directorate of Emergency Services

- Promptly answer/return all calls, texts, and messages you receive during and after completing recreation on Post. It could be the LEC or CLEO making sure you are safe. It is recommended, but not required, to set your account to accept text messages from iSportsman. A check-out reminder is normally sent approx. 30 minutes before mandatory check-out time; however, you are required to check out immediately after completion of recreational activities.
- Ensure all personal information in your iSportsman profile is complete, accurate, and up-to-date. This includes vehicle info, emergency contact info, and physical address info (no P.O. Boxes please). Be sure to inform your emergency contact that they are listed as such and make sure they understand they may need to be reached in case of an emergency (Answer the phone!). Your emergency contact's phone number should not be the same as yours! Let your emergency contact know your plans, e.g., "I'm going hunting today and plan to be back home at noon."
- <u>Hunters tracking game</u>: Hunters must call the Law Enforcement Center before mandatory checkout time in iSportsman for further instructions. Upon finding game or ending the search, you must call the Law Enforcement Center verifying you are out of the training area and checked out of iSportsman.

Natural Resources Priorities





16 U.S.C. § 670a, Sikes Act

- Authorizes hunting and fishing on military installations where resources are available
- Requires each military installation to develop an INRMP to ensure natural resources management is in compliance with military needs
- Requires that hunters and anglers must obtain BOTH the required state license and special permit issued by the installation
- Requires that fees collected by permit sales are exclusively used for conservation activities on the installation
- Requires providing public access to the installation for multipurpose use (subject to safety requirements and military security)
- Requires that outdoor recreation opportunities made available to the public are also accessible to persons with disabilities
- Promotes cooperation with USFWS and state departments






Most Important Tool: Prescribed Fire

Benefits


- Military training
 - Improves maneuver and visibility for training within the forest
 - Reduces loss of training time due to fire control
- Wildfire danger
 - Reduces the risk, number, and size of wildfires
 - Reduces damage resulting from wildfires because wildfires don't burn as hot
- Ecosystem Management
 - Longleaf/wiregrass are fire-dependent species; USFWS Biological Opinion (March 2019) for RCW management
- Wildlife Forage Enhancement
 - Stimulates diverse food sources
 - · Soil fertility enhancement
 - Herbaceous groundcover & vegetative structure enhancement for cover and nesting






















World Geodetic System of 1984 UTM Zone 17 North Units: Decimal Degrees

- Increased heavy downed fuels
- Increased smoke and prolonged smoldering of heavy fuels
- Difficult to maneuver equipment around downed trees



- Wildfires are more likely and harder to contain with equipment constraints
- Loss of groundcover in salvaged areas = no continuous fuel to carry prescribed fire



Longleaf Management - Benefits to Game Species

Wild Turkey

- "A well-managed longleaf pine ecosystem is as good as it gets for wild turkeys. Without good, consistent fire, you don't have the understory and ground story structure that's important for poults and nesting cover." —Ricky Lackey, NWTF biologist
- "Wild turkey broods are tied directly to the early successional vegetation created by these controlled burns. Brooding females and their broods select these open vegetative communities, which are typically laden with insects that provide the high energy foods poults need to rapidly grow." –Dr. Bret Collier, LSU aka @drshortspur
- "Prescribed fire is the most scalable, cost-effective method of improving nesting and brood cover across the landscape." –Dr. Will Gulsby, Auburn

White-tailed Deer

- "Periodic prescribed fire burns...stimulate the growth of various grasses, legumes and other herbaceous plants. This new growth is typically more nutritious and palatable than it was prior to burning. For deer, this means more cover and more forage. For fire to really promote understory growth, there has to be enough openings in the forest canopy so sunlight can reach the forest floor. If it can't, then some type of timber harvest needs to take place to reap the benefits of prescribed fire." –Brian Grossman, NDA
- "On average, plants contain double the protein and triple the minerals, and are 20 to 25 times more preferred by deer, compared to levels measured before the fire." –Dr. Marcus Lashley, UF aka Dr. Disturbance










Projected Timber Harvest, FY 26-29, Fort Gordon, GA










Damage from Hurricane Helene

- September 27: Hurricane Helene hits Fort Eisenhower
- Sept 27- Oct 10: Post closed to all non-essential personnel(13 days)
- October 11: Post re-opens
- All NRB efforts were to gain access to primary access roads and RCW sites
- Rented two front end loaders with grapples to clear roads
- Sept 27- Nov 26: no recreational activity allowed on Fort Eisenhower
- November 27: iSportsman reopens for recreational activities in limited areas














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














Hurricane Helene Forestry Impact

- 3,071 acres of timber harvested under a salvage contract
 - 2,488 acres clearcut
 - 583 acres thinned
- Salvage price \$3/ton vs normal price \$16/ton
- Money generated from salvaged timber: \$366,000
- Estimated loss of \$1.2 million in timber
- 9 different logging crews here at one time.
- Total number of timber sales since hurricane: 18
 - Multiple mods to timber contracts (add on acres)

NRB 2025 Fall Public Briefing 21X Account

- Money generated between 1 September 2024 25 August 2025 from the sale of Fort Gordon iSportsman permits (Hunting, Fishing, Outdoor Rec) = \$67820 going into the 21X account (FY 25 budget). Total spent this year \$61,307 + \$12,855 (iSportsman) = \$74,162
- All money (100%) collected into the 21X account is spent on Fort Gordon to support the hunting and fishing program.
- \$36,683 spent on Fisheries Management: Fish food/feeders (\$6318); Fish stocking: Trout (\$5000), Catfish (\$6465), Bream (\$7565), Bass (\$3235); Little Beaver structure repair (\$1100); Aquatic Herbicide (\$7000)
- \$22,624 spent on Game Management: Dove Fields (\$2620), Chufa/fertilizer (\$5260), FY24 Fall food plots seed (\$6334) and fertilizer (\$5960), FY25 Fall food plots (\$2420)
- Equipment and supplies: \$2000
- Remaining expenses for FY25: catfish stocking and fall food plots (~\$10,000)











Hunter and Fishermen Events Trend








20-Year Deer Harvest Trend











Antlerless Deer Harvest Quota and Regulation Reminder

- GADNR buck-only season does not apply on Fort Gordon (Either-Sex all season).
- GADNR early antierless firearms season will be Oct 4-5 in TAs 18-49 (Antierless ONLY)
- State bag limits for archery **AND firearms zones**.
- Statewide, the antler restrictions on one of the bucks are: One of the two antlered bucks must have a minimum of 4 points, 1-inch or longer, on either antler or a minimum 15-inch outside antler spread to be legal.
- Archery areas (TAs 1-17) have been approved by GADNR to fall within their Extended Archery Season. Last year 3 bucks and 2 does were harvested during this extended season.

Check Station Reminders

- Hunters must submit a jawbone from every deer harvested on the installation. Jawbones (does and bucks) must be submitted before leaving Fort Gordon unless buck is being mounted; If mounting, then jawbone must be turned in within 7 days.
- NRB would like to (Not Mandatory) measure ALL bucks, and some does harvested during normal duty hours (7:30-16:00, Monday- Friday), regardless of size. Please call 706-832-7661 for instructions.
- Deer and turkey kill card information should be submitted through iSportsman during the check-out process BEFORE leaving the installation (This is IN ADDITION TO GADNR game check requirements.).







The Natural Resources Branch manages a total of 476 acres across 505 total food plots for supplementing the diets of fauna species such as White-tailed Deer, Wild Turkey, Mourning Dove, and Bobwhite Quail through their forage. So far in FY 25, 80 plots have been planted in chufa, spring mix, and dove fields totaling 80 acres. Fall plots are scheduled to begin planting in early September totaling \$4500 in seed and \$4620 in fertilizer.


















Dove Fields for 2025

- Credit cards were frozen from February April
- Total cost for 2024 dove fields is approximately \$11,025.
- Total Cost for 2025 dove fields was approximately \$2,620
- Seed: Sunflowers 1 bags (\$60), Corn 1 bags (\$220), Total \$280
- Fertilizer: 80 bags X \$16.75 = \$1340
- Chemicals: \$1000
- Electric Fence: \$0
- Only planted 1/3 of normal dove field
- Been spraying weeds and burning in preparation for future years (killing sandspurs)

- Hunters should position themselves at least 70 yards apart while hunting
- Hunters should never shoot at low flying birds
- Limit is 15 doves per day













Fish Harvest & Fishing Participation Trend







iSportsman-Common Problems


- Failure to Check Out Regulation states that you must be checked out when finished with your activity regardless of the iSportsman required check-out time.
- Public Access: Make sure the name on your iSportsman profile matches your driver's license. If there are discrepancies, the VCC may not accept your 9243 or issue you an access pass. Ex: Use your full name, not nickname; changing maiden name/married name.
- Make sure contact phone # (mobile phone), emergency contact #, email, and vehicle info is updated and correct in your profile.
- Make sure you select "Yes" to allow texting so you can be contacted for important matters (failure to check out, area closing, emergency info, etc.).
- If text is allowed, you should receive text 30 minutes before check out time as a reminder to do so. <u>Two</u> <u>failures to check out within a 6-month period will result</u> in suspension of privileges.









Installation Access Reminders

- Everyone bringing a firearm onto the installation is required to have an approved FG Form 9243 on their person. Participant (Guest) and their permitted sponsor may fill out a Form 7160 for temporary firearms usage during hunting seasons.
- Public Access can get a long-term gate access pass linked to their valid driver's license (good for 1 year from date background check (Form 9243) was completed).
 - Bring 3 copies of FG Form 9243 (newest updated version) to the VCC and a copy of your driver's license.
 - Wait 30 days for processing of the 9243.
 - Return to VCC to link pass to your driver's license and pick up approved 9243.
- Participants/Guests must enter through the installation access gates in the same vehicle as sponsor (may be required to stop at VCC)
 - For VCC hours contact: (706) 791-3788/3071.
 - It is recommended that weekend visitors obtain visitor's pass ahead of time (VCC closed Saturdays and Sundays).






Regulation Reminders

- Participants must have a daily or weekly permit. Sponsor and participant must also have a completed NAF form 7160 or 9243.
- All hunters, regardless of age, must have a hunter education certificate to hunt.
- All sportsmen need to display a Fort Gordon Training Area Parking pass. They can be printed from iSportsman (under Regulations & Forms).
- Be sure you understand the check-in/out procedures (especially for participants, guests, and youth).
 - Tutorial for using iSportsman is available on the website's homepage (slides 18-20 & 31).
 - Participants and youth will check-out themselves.
- ATV use on the installation is prohibited unless authorization is given by DES.
- Air bows and air rifles are NOT permitted on Fort Gordon even though they are permitted by the state of Georgia.
- All firearms must be transported in a zippered or lockable case and transported separate from the ammo.



NRB 2025 Fall Public Briefing iSportsman Cost for FY 2026

- In 2025 IMCOM required \$12,855 for iSportsman, approx 15% of FY 24 (\$86,130) budget.
- In 2024 IMCOM required \$27,210 for iSportsman, approx 37% of FY 23 (\$73.825) budget.
- In 2023 IMCOM required \$15,642 for iSportsman, approx 19.5% of FY 22 (\$80,220) budget.
- In 2022 IMCOM required \$20,000 for iSportsman, approx 29% of FY 21 (\$68,565) budget.

4-year 21x average = \$77,185

PROPOSED FUTURE ISPORTSMAN COST FROM IMCOM

- Number of installation users X \$15 = installation iSportsman cost
- FY 26 Fort Gordon iSportsman users 2433 X \$15 =\$36,495
- Projected FY 25 Budget \$70,000 \$36,495(iSportsman) = \$33,505.
- iSportsman will cost approximately 52% of FY 25(\$70,000) budget.
- ISportsman cost \$36,495 + DES Cost \$3,100 = \$39,595 Admin cost
- \$39,595 / \$77,185 = 51% of annual budget at current fee schedule.
